DSCSHN: Who do we serve?


Children or youth who have or are at increased risk for a chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional condition and who also require health and related services beyond that required for children generally.

- Nearly 20% of U.S. children under age 18 years have a special health care need
- One in five U.S. families has a child or youth with a special health care need
- Services needed from multiple systems: health care, public health, education, mental health, and social services




Overarching Goal

Program Priorities






RGN Program Objectives 2020-2024

By May 2024,

- 1. Each RGN will facilitate connections to genetic services for at least 2,000 individuals or families with or at risk for genetic conditions, within the geographic area served by the RGN.
- 2. Increase to at least 33% of the individuals who are medically underserved with or at risk for genetic conditions, served by each RGN.
- 3. Increase by 20% the number of health care providers receiving education or training through the RGN.
- 4. Increase by 20% the number of individuals with or at risk for genetic conditions, receiving genetic services through telemedicine visits.
- 5. Increase by 20% the number of RGN resources accessed.

Fighting COVID-19 in Rural Health Care Settings

Rural Health Clinics

\$225 Million

 Funding to 4,500 rural health clinics to expand testing, training, procuring protective equipment

Small Rural Hospitals

• \$150 million

 CARES Act funding awarded to 1,779 small rural hospitals to support testing, lab services, training, and procuring equipment

Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response Program

• \$15 Million

 Funding to 52 tribes, tribal organizations, urban Indian health organizations, and other health service providers

COVID-19 Claims Reimbursement to Health Care Providers and Facilities for Testing and Treatment of the Uninsured Program allows providers to file claims for reimbursement for testing or treatment provided to uninsured individuals with a COVID-19 diagnosis on or after Feb. 4, 2020.

Telehealth Investments

\$46.5 Million Investment Across HRSA Programs

- \$15 million for provider telehealth training
- \$15 million to key areas in maternal and child health
- \$11.5 million to HRSA-funded Telehealth Resource Centers
- \$5 million to assist telehealth clinicians on licensure and credentialing


